



**NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF STATE TRUST LANDS
RESOLUTION 2025-0004**

**BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT'S
CONSERVATION AND LANDSCAPE HEALTH RULE**

Whereas, the member states of the National Association of State Trust Lands (“NASTL”) are collectively the second largest landowner in the United States and manage trust lands, minerals, and waterways through their respective states; and

Whereas, members of NASTL have congressional and state constitutional mandates to manage millions of acres of lands for the multi-generational benefit of trust beneficiaries, including public education, through economic development, conservation, recreation, and other trust and public purposes as provided by their respective mandates; and

Whereas, due to the nature of the state trust grants, millions of acres of state trust lands currently lie scattered within United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management managed lands across western states preventing states from carrying out their state constitutional mandates and inhibiting proper management of state trust lands and federal lands; and

Whereas, the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management has finalized its Conservation and Landscape Health Rule, 89 Fed. Reg. 91, (May 9, 2024) that fundamentally changes the management priorities for the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management managed lands across the West; and

Whereas, the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management’s rules for the management of federal lands that surround state trust lands heavily impacts states’ ability to manage trust lands to generate income for educational and other state purposes; and

Whereas, the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management’s Conservation and Landscape Health Rule will “apply land health standards to all United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management managed public lands and uses” and “establishes a definition of conservation that encompasses both protection and restoration actions” and “clarifies that conservation is a use on par with other uses of the public lands under the Federal Land Policy and Management Act’s multiple-use and sustained-yield mandate” and that United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management will prioritize designating and protecting Areas of Critical Environmental Concern. The Final Rule seeks to provide an overarching framework for multiple United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land

Management programs to promote ecosystem resilience on public lands according to the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management; and

Whereas, the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management does not mention nor consider in the Final Rule potential impacts on the state trust lands' inholdings and how a new management strategy will impact NASTL members' ability to effectively access and manage state trust lands; and

Whereas, NASTL members seek to uphold the multiple use sustained yield principles contained within the Federal Land Policy and Management Act which help facilitate appropriate management of state trust lands' inholdings for the generation of income for state trust lands; and

Whereas, numerous States and organizations have filed suit against the Bureau of Land Management's Conservation and Landscape Health Rule; and

Whereas, the current Administration has committed to rescinding the Bureau of Land Management's Conservation and Landscape Rule.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

1. NASTL respectfully requests the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management to rescind the Bureau of Land Management's Conservation and Landscape Rule through appropriate measures and manage public lands pursuant to the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976 through localized Resource Management Planning to fully assess and analyze the impacts of management decisions on state trust lands.
2. NASTL respectfully requests the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management to uphold the multiple use sustained yield standards enumerated in the Federal Land Policy and Management Act and not exceed the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management's current authorities without United States Congressional approval.
3. NASTL respectfully requests the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management to assess and analyze impacts on state trust lands' inholdings as part of all federal regulatory and administrative rulemaking efforts prior to finalization of such regulations and rulemakings.
4. NASTL respectfully requests the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management to fully fund and provide necessary resources to facilitate land exchanges with state trust land agencies to improve state and federal management of their respective lands and minerals.
