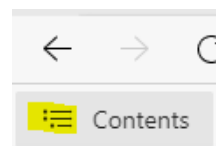




FY20 Member State Data

Alaska MHT	The Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority is a corporation of the state but a 7 member board of trustees determines the management and use of Trust funds. These trustees are appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Legislature. The Trustees are non-state employees selected for either finance, resource management, or health program management experience or some combination of the above. The Trustees approve use of trust funds for administrative costs, land management, program staff, grants, use on mental health initiatives, including paying part of state department operating funds that further the care and treatment of mental health beneficiaries. This is in alignment with the Comprehensive Integrated Mental Health Services plan. The Legislature also approves budgets approved by the board of trustees submitted through the state budget process. The Executive Director has full authority to manage trust lands for the Trust Authority, but must seek budgetary approvals for operational budgets and special projects and must consult with the board of trustees before taking any permanent disposal action on trust lands.
